Also, a new rate schedule is in effect. With proof of paid membership your submissions are at the old rate of \$3.50 per element. Without said proof, each element is now \$5.00. Cancelled checks do not constitute proof of membership.

Greetings! I would like to call everyone's attention to the flyer concerning Champion's Tourney, specifically the details in regard to the Arts and Sciences Championship. Read it! Enter! I know there are many talented people in Vatavia; I would like to see evidence of those talents.

Let me first repeat the rules, then I will expand on them a bit

RULES FOR THE ARTS AND SCIENCES CHAMPIONSHIP

Three entries are required for the championship, with at least one art and one science in those three. Anyone may enter. Anyone may enter items in arts or sciences without the requisite three, and be considered for the arts or sciences prize only, not the championship. Items that have been entered in previous competitions of any kind and have won in such competitions are not eligible; items entered but never having won are eliqible.

All entries vill be judged against Calontir judging criteria, not against other entries. Entries requiring performance vill be performed and judged at a specific time in the afternoon. Performance entries are to be no longer than 10 minutes and no group performances vill be allowed at this championship.

Prizes will be given for the outstanding arts entry and the outstanding science entry. The person with the highest total score (of the three entries added together) will be created the Vatavian Arts and Sciences Champion.

Now to expand on these rules. First, you don't have to enter the championship. You may enter the competition and compete for the arts and science prizes.


If you have entered a competition, and your entry won, that entry is not eligible to compete. If you entered and did not win, you may enter it in the championship. The Baroness expressed a wish to see new items if possible. I echo this wish. But do not feel obligated to make all new just for this.

I have a complete set of the current Calontir judging criteria. If you want a copy of any particular category criteria, let me know. I plan on being at all costuming sessions, and will try to attend fighter

WHAT IS THE V'TAVIAN CHAMPION?

As a one time V'Tavian Champion, and knowing a bit about the Barony's history, I have seen some changes come to the "office". Each champion has acted, (or not acted), differently. Although I've heard many people ask "What is a champion supposed to do?". I hope to express my OPINION with this article.

Originally the V'Tavian Champion was created to be a "go-between", for the populace and the officers/Baronage. There were concerns that some people had gripes that were not being heard for one reason or another. The Champion was the peoples' advocate. I like to think that this is not as necessary as it once was, but this extra ear to the people is available, even now. This should apply to the Luchisnic and A&S Champion as well.

Traditionally, the Champion has been the symbol of the Barony's fighting prowess, the symbol of enforcement and the general of the V'Tavian forces. Whereas the Knights' Marshal office functions to organize the training of the fighters in basic techniques, the Champion organizes the fighters into a unit, and teach tactics. The Champion also suggests strategy and tactics and organizes war efforts.


The Archer-Champion, (Luchisnic), should do the same in the area of archery. Working in conjuction with the Archer-Marshal, the Luchisnic should incourage newer archers and do what he/she can to generate more interest. The same principle can be applied to the new Arts and Sciences Champion. They are not specifically cheerleaders, but then again, they do their share of whipping up enthusiasm and therefore the enjoyment of others.

A champion's duty might be viewed as being more of an idea and enthusiasm generator. The officers do more of the paperwork and detail teaching and guiding, while the champion considers a broader (strategic), scale. If we are having an event, and there are no competitions/displays/activities in the champions area of intrest, the champion might want to suggest some. Most of all, the champion should incourage activity and learning in his/her area of interest.

In total, this may not sound like much; however, it means a great deal. It is a responsibility that should not be shirked or taken lightly. Inspiration and interest in the individual champion's area can live or die by what the champion does or does not do.

Think about these things before you enter the V'Tavian Champion's List, The Luchisnic Archery Shoot, OR the V'Tavian Arts & Sciences Champion's Competition: ARE YOU READY TO DO THE JOB?

Note-- the Straz and Zeman Stray, the Vojak and the Veslar, and the Awards for Arts, Sciences, and the Act of Dedication are equivalent in precedence. The positions of the Baronage, the Champion, the Lucistnik and the Officers are here omitted because they are not, strictly speaking, awards or orders.

ORDERS--Orders are given only once, and a person is referred to as a "companion" of the order. The orders of V tavia are as follows:

Star of V'tavia--given for longstanding service to the Barony, which has improved the group and brought us favorable notice from outside. Its unofficial badge is: A burst of rays Or, a mullet of eight argent, bearing a roundel azure charged with a dragonfly volant en arriere Or.

Sword of Valor-given to those who have won Valortourney. Its registered badge is: Per bend sinister Or and azure a dragonfly volant en arriere and a sword counterchanged

Radiant Lioness--given for outstanding achievement in the arts or sciences. Its registered badge is: Azure, in pale a lioness couchant coward and a demi-sun inverted Or

Golden Heart--given for continued service to the Barony. Its unofficial badge is: A dragonfly volant en arriere azure upon a heart Or

Straz--given to especially accomplished fighters

Zeman Strav--given to especially accomplished archers

Vojak--given to promising fighters

Veslar--given to promising archers

AWARDS--Awards may be given more than once. In V tavia awards are symbolized by braided cords of various colors. Once a cord is given, additional awards of the same type are symbolized by small golden leaves to be attached to the cord. A person is referred to as a "recipient" of an award.

Victory in Competition-given for winning a competition (tourney or arts and sciences) at an official SCA event. This is symbolized by a solid red cord.

Achievement in the Arts--given for promise in the arts. This is symbolized by a cord of blue and white.

Achievement in the Sciences--given for promise in the sciences. Co-equal with recipients of the Achievement in the Arts. This is symbolized by a cord of red and gold.

Act of Dedication-given to those who have performed some specific act of service to the Barony. This is symbolized by a cord of white.

Populace Cord--when a person becomes a paid member of the SCA, Inc. they are awarded a cord of blue.

----- A former Atlantian.

-----A coptic lady who used to reside in Alexandria but is now in England, late 7th early 8th century.

There can never be a system of giving awards which all participants perceive as equitable. If some get award "X" while others do not, at least some of those others will feel slighted. If everyone gets award "Y" some will ask, "If everyone gets it does it have any value?"

In the first case there are some criteria of skill or service which must be met. These criteria may appear arbitrary and may change with the times and persons giving the awards. Regardless, the implication is that there is some standard which must be met before the award is given. If one viewed the crown as an award, that would be a good example of clearly specified criteria. Defeat everyone else in crown tourney and you are the next King (or Queen).

The second case has no specific performance criteria. Sooner or later everyone in the society (who stays around long enough) can get one. A good example of this second case is the Award of Arms.

Most awards fall somewhere in between these two extremes. In every case there are some criteria, but often a very large part of the decision process depends upon the personal judgment of other individuals. What basis does the person making the recommendation for an award use. There are at least four possible approaches one might choose to use:

- 1. The improvement in skill level is so great as to merit an award.
- 2. The skill level meets some pre-defined criteria and merits an award.
- 3. S/he is as good as the average person with the award and therefore merits it.
- H. I have the award and s/he is as good as I am and therefore merits an award.

Is one of these views correct and the others not? I suspect that the basis we use to make a decision about a recommendation is a matter upon which we will choose to disagree among ourselves. I would like to think that the last approach (Number 4) is not one used in V'Tavia. I propose that we do not leave the issue there. I suggest that we look at what we are attempting to accomplish by giving awards, at least within the Barony.

I will maintain that some awards should reflect an individual's attempts rather than his successes. I feel that this support for each individual's attempts to improve his skills, attempts to try something new, etc. is an important basis for the development of new skills and, more importantly, the growth of positive feelings toward all other members of the Barony. Won't giving awards on this basis produce lots of some types of awards? Perhaps, but I personally feel that people working to improve themselves or help the Barony should be acknowledged as doing something of importance. It is a truely rare individual would finds a complement of no value because s/he has received it

many times. I know of no actor that has ever felt $\,$ s/he had gotten too much applause.

I believe most awards for both skills and service should have more objective criteria than they do presently. Will that lead to some people just doing barely enough to obtain some award? The answer is yes. On the other hand, so what. If the criteria for the award have been well thought out, they have demonstrated the skills required, therefore they are good at whatever it is they got the award for. Is a Knight any less worthy because s/he happened to be a natural fighter and only had to learn a bit about the different weapon systems and safety to be rated as an excellent fighter? More objective criteria might reduce many of the "why didn't I get one" statements. When it is clearer what the criteria are, fewer persons are likely to ask why they didn't receive the award.

Have any problems been solved, probably not. I hope that I have offered some thoughts which might affect how we think about the awards we recommend, the awards we get and the ones we didn't. So far as I know our award processes at both the Baronial and Kingdom level are not cast in stone and I suspect that both the Baronage and the Crown would listen to well-thought out proposals for change. I would hope that we might start an open exhange within the Barony. We will undoubtedly find areas of disagreement. Perhaps discussions of those diagreements will produce some better understanding of what different people expect from the SCA and perhaps allow all of us to work toward decreasing the degree of our disagreement.

Feeling somewhat emboldened by my own words, I would like to recommend that the Baronage consider a slight alteration in the way acts of dedication are viewed (or develop an additional service award). The award should be given to anyone whose efforts make a difference in the success of an event. At the Renaissance Faire, a lot of people helped set up and/or tear down, and/or spent hours at archery, ran errands, manned the information booth, or answered endress questions from people about the SCA. Did some folks do more that others? Certainly. On the other hand, if just a few of the poeple who gave up their Friday evening to help set up for the Faire had not come, what would that have meant to the remainder of the folks who would have been left to do the job. I believe that if a large part of the populace works hard for the success of an event like Ren Faire, then a large part of the populace should be formally acknowledged as having do so.

Remove from heat and add tea and strain the Mixture

Let cool to 70 degrees and add yeast and nutrients

Remove froth for 3 days

ferment in warm, Dark place for 2-3 months or until clear.

Rack with 1 lump of sugar/btl.
