Every Northman worth mentioning had one and many of them were quite large and frankly stiff to the point of being a bit clubby. But being "barbarians" they had a fascination with size, perhaps out of subconscious fear of finding themselves inadequate to the task at hand. Their attitudes toward them were much different than the more refined and demure men of southern climes. The Northmen did not hide them as "civilized" men did, hoping to use them from behind on some helpless victim in a back alley of Milkagard. They were proudly displayed and highly valued as symbols of manly prowess and care. They were often taken out before guests so that they could feel the heft

and balance of the old weapon. Comments would be made on its form and occasionally on its decoration if the owner was lucky enough to have found a craftsman to emblazon some sentiment, name, or slogan upon it. Some which were of properly large dimensions would have entire scenes depicted on them, usually of woodland creatures or of some great chase or combat the owner had been party to. The male invariably would compare the preferred tool to their own, voicing opinions concerning how the host's thickness or tip-heavy structure might affect difficulty of penetration. These opinions were sometimes hotly debated, then put to a practical test of some sort. A favorite was to have the owner thrust its point into a stout beam and then invite those present to stand on it. The women folk were usually more concerned with its overall beauty and it is said that many of them considered a truly fine example to be a work of art worthy of remembering for generations. Many distaff conversations would feature one goodwife remarking that her son's was much the same size and shape as his father's, in fact that all the menfolk of that line seemed to have a tendency towards form and length. Though this was often the case within clans or households, among Northmen considered as a whole there were great differences between individuals. Occasionally, men sporting huge dimensions in all other forms of equipment had quite a petite one, whereas a wiry little fellow would be possessed of one of mammoth porportions which was frankly a bit difficult to lug around on a daily basis as it would constantly bang into walls when its owner was trying to negotiate a corner. In like cases, it was considered wise to firmly bind it to one's thigh when indoors to prevent it from catching on or poking in to something best left alone.

But enough of these long distance assertions gleaned from general works. Often one gets a better feel for a subject by going to a root source. I present for your perusal and enlightenment a selection from <u>An Illuminated History and Genealogy of Von Schtupf Family</u> by Lady Lillian Von Schtupf, Buch Sechs: the Viking Woodpile.* The narrator is one Wanker Stiffison, called Wanker Schannstucher, a raiding Dane who made his home near Hedeby in modern day northern Germany.

"I got mine from my father and its length and rugged build have served me well, as it has hard usage throughout my travels. It is indeed a precious possession to me, worth more than even a shuip or horse, for without this basic equipment a man might not survive at all if left to himself. My father's ending is an extreme but telling example. Stiffi Bonesson in his declining years attempted a boarding a Gotland trader as it sailed the Vi, thinking to make

himself rich on plunder from such an intaking(sic). They were well armed and cunning in battle as are most Gotlanders. Stiffi found himself beaten off in short order, with men dead and bulwarks during the combat his most favored tool; had been struck fron him and over the side into the deep salt sea. As he returned home in his foundering ship with many empty benches near her stove-in sides, the loss of his weapon pained him sorely. In the depths of that winter, his despair took him more than his wounds as he felt the whole district to be sniggering at his misfortune and the losss of his manly symbol of prowess was to great for him to bear. "I myself suffered from an intemperate youth in which I badly used what my father bequeathed me. In the mad passion of adolescence, I stuck it into practically anything that remained resonably still long enough. Besides its more common uses, I that I would use it to pry boards apart with. At last, in a moment of drunken folly, I thrust it into the stony earth, breaking off its tip. To see the broken stub of it in my hand and to hear the sorrowful wail of my young wife was almost more than I could bear. Straightway I resolved to find a proper replacement. I would go find a weapon of legend and wrest it from a corpse of he who in life bore it so proudly. I plundered the howe(sic) of Grettir the Strong and in spite of the possibility of troll-craft cursing me for disturbing his bones, I took his for my own as he seemed not to need it anymore. In my plight, I felt I had little to lose and much might be gained. After a bit of awkwardness, I found that what was formerly Grettir's fit me well and was even more massive than mine had been. Of course, my good wife protests at the sight of this dead man's thing whenever I have need to use it around the house, but it pleases me well and that, in the need is all that is truly necessary."

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
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Stepping down from the high levity of double meaning, there was a tradition in northern Europe from about the 500's to well into the 1200's in some areas, of carrying a large knife referred to diversely as a sax, seax, scramasax or screamasax. It was both a weapon and a general purpose survival tool with many differing forms and lengths. The unifying design similarities were that it was longer than nine inches in blade length and never double bladed or dagger shaped. Usually it was singled edged and occasionally false edge that was distinctly Bowie-like, which could be sharpened at the bearer's preference. Example drawings illustrate some of the forms seen. A joyous spring to you and may your Maypole be wrapped 'round with ribbons by maidens fair!

A Byzantine Cookbook

by Demetrius il Condotierro

A variety of medieval dishes take a great deal of preparation work. Some, however, allow all of the preparation work to be dine well in advance, the dish refrigerated or frozen and then reheated when desired. Torta Bourbonaise is a dish like that and so are Chicken Pasties Lombard (from the Goodman of Paris), recipe 78:

Chicken may be set in a pasty on their backs with the breast upward and large slices of bacon on the breast, and then covered. Item: in the Lombard manner, when the chickens are plucked and prepared, take beaten eggs, both the yolks and the whites, with verjuice and spice powder, and dip you chickens in this; and set them in the pasty with strips of bacon as above.

There is the possibility that these are separate recipes which offer different levels of spicing. I have prepared the second version and have used boneless chicken. There is nothing in the second recipe which strongly suggests that the chicken may have been boned. Prepared may most likely be assumed to mean eviscerated. On the other hand, since the gentleman who wrote the Goodman of Paris was an older man providing training for his new wife, he may have considered preparation for Chicken Lombard to include skinning and boning the bird.

Basically, the recipe calls for a pastry in which egg dipped chicken are sprinkled with verjuice and spices, covered with bacon strips and then enclosed in the pastry and baked.

- 2 whole chicken breasts (4 servings)
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 tsp verjuice (substituting lemon juice or vinegar will produce a <u>much</u> stronger flavor)
- 1/4 tsp each cinnamon, cloves, and ginger
- 1/8 tsp mace
- 4 slices of bacon (partially cooked)
- Pastry (recipe of your choosing)

Cook the bacon to reduce the amount of fat. Since period cooking often added fat, uncooked bacon may have been closer to the original than is

this redaction (I cooked the bacon until there was little observable fat left). Pat chicken dry, dip in egg and verjuice mixture, and then sprinkle ¼ of spice mixture over each half breast. Partially roll out pastry. Divide into fourths. Fully roll out pastry and place each half breast on a piece of pastry, top with bacon and bring the remaining pastry over the top to form an enclosed shell. Pinch the edges shut. Bake for approximately 35 minutes in a 375° oven, until golden.

The chicken pastries may be served at this point or cooled. The reheat well in a boiling bag (but they must be frozen when placed into the boiling water - DO NOT THAW) or wrapped in aluminum foil (they may be frozen or partially defrosted when reheated in foil).

Note that the specific ingredients of the spice mixture is not specified in the Goodman of Paris. Ginger, cinnamon, and cloves are very common spices. Mace is also found with some frequency in the Goodman of Paris. Other spices, including pepper, sugar, grains of paradise, salt, galingale, saffron, etc. are all possible as part of the mixture and may have been used as a function of what the cook had on hand at that moment.


