Interest was also expressed in holding another BUSH session. Some of the officers have already been discussing the possibility.

The Seneschal has a flier for the Westumbria event, Ragnarok Lite, August 5th. He asked the officers for input/choices on six new business card formats proposed. His Bash-a-Knight proposal is awaiting the return of comments from Kingdom before being finalized for presentation to the Board of Directors. Anyone wishing to look at the proposal, contact him.

The Baronage requested that award recommendations be turned in,especially Kingdom awards. Without the recommendations those deserving individual will not receive the recognition they are entitled to. The Baronage also asked that the local forms be used for local awards recommendations please.

Greetings unto to populace from Anne Lockwood, Bardic Champion

I have been asked to write a few words about camp and court etiquette. There are some things that we who have been members of the SCA for several years tend to take for granted that everyone knows. This is not always the case. Hopefully, this article will help to explain some of those practices.

One of the things I noticed at the Birthday Bash was that people were using someone's personal shade fly without even asking if it was ok. The lady who owned the shade fly didn't really say anything, but it was disconcerting for me to watch. It is rather like someone coming into your home without even knocking, taking over a portion of your home without even knocking, taking over a portion of your house, and not even saying "excuse me". While this may seem like an exaggeration, it's not far from reality. A person's shade fly is as much their own "space" as is a person's home. If you aren't sure if a shade fly is a private or publicly set up one, ASK. This is a simple way to find out. If it is a private shade fly, ask if there is a public one you can use, or if the person who owns the shade fly would mind if you used theirs for a short time. But PLEASE., use consideration and common sense if they say yes. Do not overstay your welcome, act as you would if you were in someone else's home, and above all else, be courteous and

respectful. Also be aware that they have the right to say no. If they do say no, courteously thank them and find somewhere else to sit.

The idea of asking to use someone's shade fly, also goes for entering someone's pavilion or shade fly. Ask before just entering. This is common courtesy. If there is something inside the shade fly that you would like to look at or someone you would like to talk to, ask if it is ok if you come in. Most people will say yes if you ask them politely. Also, don't use someone's pavilion as a walkway from one place to another. Walk around if possible. These are all examples of common courtesy and are things we all, new and old members alike, need to remember.

There are a few other things that some newer members may not know. When crossing in front of the thrones, whether Baronial or Kingdom, one should bow or curtsy. This is also common practice not to walk between the people on those thrones and whatever they are watching. Walk behind their chairs if it is possible. If it isn't possible, say "excuse me" and cross as quickly and quietly as you can. Again, it all goes back to common courtesy.

If you are at an event and someone asks for help, try to help out if you can. You may not know how to set up a pavilion, but people will be willing to tell you what they need you to do. Holding onto a pole doesn't seem like a big deal, but if there isn't someone doing it, the tent might not get put up. Every little bit helps. If you have an extra hand, help someone carry things from their car to the site. This doesn't seem like much but I know some wonderful friendships that have been started because someone took the time to help carry things. So you see, there are advantages to helping. It's a good way to meet and get to know people.

There is one other thing I would like to address, how to behave when in court. When in court, Baronial or other, be courteous and respectful (are you starting to see a recurring theme here?). If you feel like you are going to want to talk and joke around, sit to the back of the court not the front. Even at the back of the crowd, be aware that there may be people around you who are wanting to hear and who may not appreciate your talking through the proceedings. When someone is called into court, especially for an award, show them the respect they deserve. Even if you don't care for the person, someone felt that they deserved the award and they have the right to enjoy the moment. Think how you would feel if you were called up for an award and a group of people in the crowd were talking and laughing so loud that most of the people couldn't hear what you were getting the award for. Put yourself in that person's shoes and act accordingly.

These guidelines aren't only for the newcomers in the group, but also for those of us who have been in for a while. Sometimes ever we forget the basics of courtesy and respect. We "oldsters" need to remember that we were all "newbies" once and allow for some mistakes. We need to remember to teach by example and well as formal instruction. Correct gently, and remember, we all had to start somewhere. We only learn if someone takes the time to teach us and most newcomers would welcome advice or instructions if they are doing something wrong. But if they don't know they are doing something wrong, how can they correct it. They only need to be taught and we should be the ones doing the teaching.

I thank you for your time and patience as I got up on my soapbox. I hope that this article offers some help and insight.

# LILIES WAR

The war had been going for about a week when I arrived. The Baronies and Shires were at it again for the second, or was it the third, time. #### A Byzantine Cookbook

#### Candied Orange Peel

Quite frankly, this recipe is based on information in Elinor Fettiplace's receipt Book, John Murrell's "A Daily exercise for Ladies and Gentlewomen" (1617) and W.I. Gent's A True Gentlewoman's Delight (1653). There is comparatively little difference among the recipes so I'll just provide Gent's which is a bit more descriptive.

Take the peel of your oranges and lemons, the white cut away, then lay them in water five or six dayes, shifting them twice every day, them seeth then till they be very tender, then take them out of the water, and let them lie til they be cold, then cut them in small pieces square, the bigness of a penny or less, then take to every three, two ounces of sugar, put to it a quantity of fair water, and a lesse quantity of Rosewater, and make your sirupe thereof, then skum it very clean, and put in your peels, and let them boil for the space of an hour or longer, if you find your liquor wanting you may put in more water at your pleasure, then boyle them a little space after with a little sharpe fire, stirring it always for burning, then take it off the fire three or four times, stirring them all the while, and then set them on again until they be candied. (Murrell adds that they are to be taken out and dried. Fettiplace offers the additional option of rolling them in sugar and then drying).

The peels I started with had spent 3 to 5 months in alcohol, sugar and spices producing orange liqueur. Consequently, some differences in results may reflect the initial use of these peels. I can't imagine a period cook throwing away orange peel, so being candied after producing liqueur seems to be philosophically very appropriate.

Peels fro approx 6 oranges (zest only) 3 cups of sugar, separated water

Rinse the peels in several changes of water. Since I didn't use bitter seville oranges, there seemed to be no need to soak them. I then heated them to a simmer and allowed them to simmer for about 5 minutes. I repeated this process three times. This should make the peel translucent and soften it.

[Note: as an accidental discovery, allowing them boil for substantially longer periods of time at greater heat will produce something that can be made into a crumbly fruit leather. It takes a while to dry (at least 10 days without a food drier or oven), but seems to keep for months, at least].
