


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## FROM THE BARONAGE

Although snow now blankets the lands, Spring will be with us in only a few weeks. With Spring comes Spring Cleaning! The Baronial property is in some serious need of refurbishing. This is going to be a huge project, but we fortunately have a cunning plan of attack.

First, The Ordering--The Baronial property will be looked at, piece by piece, and sorted into five stacks: 1. Stuff we use, we need, and we want to keep. 2. Stuff that would be useful if we fixed it. 3. Stuff that would be better used by some division of the Barony--for instance, the Bucket o' Wooden Spoons was allocated to our Ministry of Children for making puppets. 4. Stuff that is of no use to the Barony, but might be useful to someone. 5. Stuff that is of no use to anyone, and really should be given a decent burial.

Lady Christine Joye Stewart, our Minister of Property, will be in charge of The Ordering. The Ordering will take place February 15th at Minisa Park.

Second, The Cleansing--The Stuff for Other Parts of The Barony will be reallocated--this might involve simply making the group aware of the presence of The Stuff so that it will be used. Fifty-six wooden spoons do no one any good if they simply sit in a shed year after year!

The Stuff Useful to Someone Else will be auctioned off. This will take place at a local event, such as Champions or Birthday Bash. It has been our experience that a festive atmosphere is most conducive to auctions.

The Really Useless Stuff will be pitched, burned, or given away (if we can find anyone to take it).

Third, The Renewal--The Broken Stuff will be fixed, polished, painted, or refurbished by a devoted Can-Do Crew. Much has already been identified for fixing, and we'll do a lot of this during The Ordering.

Fourth, The Rebirth--Remember the Neat Stuff Committee from oh, so many years ago? We're going to have another one. This is going to be a committee of people who want to make flashy stuff so the Barony can "show off" a bit. We're going to identify what the Barony needs or wants and figure

out how to make it. This might include banners, regalia for Champions, tabards for fighters, badges for officers--whatever the NSC can imagine.

Now the question that we're sure is running through everyone's mind--How can I help?

- 1. If you have Baronial property in your possession, give it to Lady Christine. Please take a few minutes to check through your house and make sure you aren't devoting your space to some property you've forgotten you have. If you can't transport it, tell her, and she'll make arrangements. In some cases, all you will have to do is write what you have on a piece of paper and give it to her--for instance, the dancers don't have to turn in the boom box for inventory, and the Champions don't have to bring all their regalia for inventory (unless it's in need of repair).
- 2. Volunteer for The Ordering. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to come. We need both strong backs and sharp minds--this is going to be large project, and many decisions will have to be made. One person's trash is another's treasure--we don't want to mis-classify a "treasure in disguise"!
- 3. Support your Auction. This auction is an "everybody wins" situation-the Swap Meet taught us that. The buyer gets a new treasure, the Barony (which is all of us) gets funds to make new and better stuff. We would also like to include other stuff at this auction--perhaps you have a few things in your closet which you would like to donate for sale. Maybe you're willing to make a new dubis to auction off. Who knows? Be creative!
- 4. Make new what once was old. We'll need people willing to devote February 15th and maybe a Saturday or two repairing stuff. A volunteer to head this committee is being sought, too.
- 5. Be a member of the Neat Stuff Committee. Since the Baronial Estates become a crossroads of activity on Tuesday nights anyway, the NSC will be a Tuesday night thing. Enthusiasm will be required; skill or talent will not. We don't care if you have no applicable skills whatsoever. These completely informal frenzies of activity will begin the first Tuesday after The Ordering-February 18th, starting around 7:00.

The deadline for the March Dragonflyre is February 14. Please call submit to your chronicler.



#### DE REBUS COMITATIBUS

(Part the First)

Good Gentles all, a lively debate has been conducted on the ethereal fields of Calontir over the correct manner of kissing a lady's hand in greeting. Sliming has been excoriated, brutes and cads exposed and threatened with sharp and swift correction, and the lack of a clear code of gracious good manners lamented by all. I, Pepin, a humble pilgrim now come into the barony of Vatavia of Calontir made bold to offer the following observations. They are the gleanings of many years wandering and witnessing courts great and small, noble and ignoble, across Christendom and beyond. The good Barbarrossa of Westumbria, known to you all, has kindly encouraged me to offer them to you, sharing my hope that it may encourage true gentleness and courtesy.

The protocols of greeting are the essence of civility, chivalry, courtesy, gentleness (in the archaic sense), and nobility. The modern abandonment of these concepts has left us less civilized and less human. The SCA has an opportunity to teach these values again and so restore an essential part of our heritage.

The meaning of Civility is citizenship, and particularly the behaviors and duties towards one's fellows that allow us to live together in peace and fullest enjoyment.

The meaning of Chivalry is the right behavior of a person entrusted with military power. Respect for the week, honor for all honorable, and reverence for authority are combined with courage and self-sacrifice into graciousness. Courtesy is in its origins courtliness, i.e., that behavior which is necessary in the courts of power. Where powerful people meet, conflicts and misunderstandings must be avoided, and 'courteous behavior' becomes an art of survival and of advantage.

The meaning of Gentle is not meekness, but rather a thing more like sensitivity. It bespeaks breeding, or training, and an acute awareness of all things, and in particular an acute awareness of all others, and the exercise of care and skill in dealing with each person that no impropriety or offense occurs.

Nobility is a visible excellence, virtue so complete as to be useful as the

example, and worthy of emulation without question. Great courts achieved, and today achieve their luster because the ruler demands and inspires proper courtesy, putting everyone at ease, and allowing thereby the greatest possible intercourse, both in official business and personal affairs. Persons of gentility (per this definition) are promoted, the rude and unmannerly rebuked, and the unlearned or unschooled taught and mentored.

All this is established and ordered through the protocols of greeting. The manner in which two persons meet always defines and describes their relationship. This was carefully elaborated in past centuries, yet we stumble today because we are unconscious of its importance. It is well observed that animals are better schooled at greeting than are moderns.

Some universal principles will, I hope, bear declaration.

The first, that the living soul before you is always deserving of your full and respectful attention. Eternal reasons aside, to deny this denies your own value and humanity.


The second, that in fair company no unwelcome conduct should be proffered or permitted.

The third, that pleasantness is the gift you give to peace.

The fourth, that superiors have a right of courtesy, inferiors are your opportunity to display true gentility, and peers and strangers are best dealt with in civility.

The fifth, that while local custom varies and should be followed as much as is not inconsistent with principles, courtesy and gentleness are skills admired in all company, and can turn any offense and almost any blade.

The sixth, that in the matter of meeting of men and women, the fair sex in all civilized lands has been accorded the higher honor for reasons too numerous to tell here. Today we live in a brutish age, where the barest of these reasons must be held forth, that there are men who will if allowed take advantage of their strength to overpower civility and trespass where they are not welcome.



## ELEANOR AND THE COURTS OF LOVE

One of the unique aspects of the Middle Ages is the concept of courtly love. And the last thing one would expect to arise in such an age. It seems almost ludicrous to expect to see hard-bitten warriors to go out and perform pointless ridiculous tasks for nothing more than the hope of some faint acknowledgment from a lady who was otherwise committed to another man. Yet that was the ideal of courtly love. Reality, of course, was much different. Nevertheless, courtly love became the touchstone for what was noble for the last half of the Middle Ages. This essay explores how this came to be.

Eleanor of Aquitaine is the central figure in the rise of courtly love. She did not invent it, but she was brought up in it. Her grandfather was one of the early troubadours who first gave voice to the sentiments that were to become courtly love. Nor were the great authors of works of courtly love members of her court. Their patroness was Marie de France, Eleanor's daughter. Her contribution was having the prestige that attracted young knights and nobles to her court where they could be imbued with the ideals of courtly love. In much the same way Louis XIV set the pattern for kingship in the baroque period.

To see how remarkable this achievement is requires knowledge of the place of women at this time. Women were little more than property having no legal standing. A woman might own property, but all legal dealings about that property had to be done through her husband or male guardian. In the eyes of the church, sex was condoned only for procreation, and otherwise women had no redeeming value, being seen as the source of mortal sin. Romantic love was a foreign concept. The one bright spot was that a woman was in charge of the daily routines of the household, only because the men had no interest in such things.

Courtly love arose in southern France for a number of reasons, including benign climate, remembrance of Roman luxury, and the influence of the studied culture in Arabic Spain. Aquitaine, the largest and wealthiest holding in Europe naturally became the center of this emerging culture. Eleanor, as heiress to this domain, was highly desirable as a wife. The first to marry her was Louis VII of France. However, Louis was a monk by disposition, and

Paris and all of northern France was more attuned to the older warrior culture. No one was happy. So when Geoffrey of Anjou offered to have his son Henry marry Eleanor, everyone was agreeable. Eleanor got rid of the depressing and "primitive" north, Henry got the lands of Aquitaine, and the king's supporters got rid of a woman who did not know her place and was a constant scandal.

To end the civil war in England between King Stephen and Empress Matilda, it was agreed that Henry, who was Matilda's son, would succeed Stephen. As the effects of the civil war wore off, the Norman aristocracy was anxious to establish their place in the scheme of things. Till now, their power rested on their skill of arms, first as Viking raiders in Normandy, then in William's conquest of England. To do this, they appropriated the old legends of King Arthur and refashioned him into a Norman knight. Into the mix Eleanor added concepts of courtly love giving more contrast to the older heroic figure of Charlemagne. This is the reason that all of the great romances of courtly love center on figures of Arthur's court.

The height of Eleanor's influence came after her break with Henry over becoming too serious with a mistress. Setting up court in her lands of Poitou as a rival for Henry's, she set about making her mark. Henry had given her control of Aquitaine to get her out of the way without actually losing the lands. The young nobility came to this court for various reasons: boredom, curiosity, and social advancement.

The last reason is the result of the laws of inheritance. These laws dictated that many would receive little or no inheritance. One of the great appeals of the First Crusade was the promise of land. Thus for many, the only way to secure one's fortune was to marry it. And there were plenty of heiresses in Eleanor's court, attracted to it by the relative freedom from men.

It was this relative strength that allowed the ladies to initiate the various games of courtly love. They were aided by the willingness of the young men to "tweak" the old order which dispossessed them. Yet the women had to be subtle, for in the end they were not mistresses of their own fortune. The final bargains of marriage were still made by men. Nevertheless, when these men left court it was after learning new lessons on how to behave. And when they came to power in their own right, they modeled their courts after Eleanor's.

Eleanor's court in Poitou came to an end in 1174 with the failure of her sons' revolt against Henry. It operated for only a little over five years. Henry had her imprisoned lest she continue to conspire against him. Though she lived past Henry, she spent the last years of her life helping Richard run the Angevin empire. The baton had been passed to her daughter Marie, in whose court a chaplain was writing what was to be the standard handbook for courtly love.

### OFFICERS' MEETING

January 6, 1997

16 officers/deputies/champions/advocates attended.

The meeting began with a lengthy discussion on upcoming events. Recent changes on the scheduling of the Kingdom's Crown and Coronation will require the rescheduling of two events, Mongols Rule and our Crown Tournament bid. Several possible alternative dates were suggested. Site availability needs to be checked before anything is finalized. Kansas Newman has not contacted us yet in regards to the Renaissance Faire in April. Our planning has already begun. Preparation is starting for some areas already.

Kingdom-level heraldic activity has resumed. Currently, 20 name and device proposals are in process for Vatavians at Kingdom level. The Chronicler reported that the office now has access to fax capabilities.

Replacing certain regalia and making new items was brought up for discussion. The work day for the refurbishing and repairing Baronial property is tentatively scheduled for February 15th pending conformation of the location. The Property Mistress has requested that lists of the location of Baronial items not in the shed be sent to her. Information on the location of several archery equipment was requested.

There are four demonstration requests presently. One for May has been approved; the others are still being arranged. Some requests have been forwarded to us through other organizations. The desire to establish certain lines of communication between these other groups was brought up.

Bardic is finalizing plans and a location for monthly meetings. Dance is still on hiatus. A change of location for the January calligraphy and illumination interest group meeting was announced. The Minister of Arts and Sciences is encouraging people to enter, attend, and support the Queen's Prize event.

Details on the formation of the Merchant Marine interest group were presented. Thorough guidelines and requirements were outlined. There are some questions about the requirements that are being looked into. The officers were asked for input and responses to this proposed plan.

Fighter practice and archery practice continue at the scheduled times. The war

party trip to Salina was planned for January 12th--if the weather cooperated. Possible crash space two hours from the War Maneuvers site was offered. Contact Christine Joye Stewart for information. Acquisition of archery nets was approved. The Archer Marshall announced that there would be a swp meet at Archery Plus, February 8th and 9th.

It was reported that the office of the Minister of Children has been transferred and made a deputy position of the Seneschal's office. The possibility of having some type of special activity at each populace meeting was proposed. The extracurricular mall and swap meet were activities that people would like to see repeated possible scheduling for these was discussed.

Reserving city buildings is difficult at this time. The officers were advised to make such arrangements as much in advance as possible. Some places are booked for up to a year in advance at this point.

The meeting adjourned.
