

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


Fighter practice remains at Watson Park, but remains on Sundays from 10:00 on. It has resumed on Wednesdays from

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THE END OF THE ROMAN EMPIRE IN THE WEST

To speak of the "fall" of the Roman Empire is to oversimplify a process of great complexity and long duration. Historians have been in no sort of agreement as to the causes of its dissolution, but most have now abandoned earlier single cause theories and support a scenario which links many mutually operative causes. The first of these, in the writer's considered opinion, and the one operating over the longest span of time, was the acquisition of territory by armed force: to wit, the military adventures that made Rome an empire extending from about 30° South Lat. To 55° North Lat. and from 40° East Long. To 14° West. Long. It has been said that Rome "conquered the world in self-defense," a true statement even if understood ironically. Resentful or frightened tribes did attack or threaten the early city/state. These were defeated, subjugated, colonized, and exploited, enlisted as allies and "protected." They became sources of land and soldiers, then had to be protected by the further conquest of adjacent territories and tribes. The empire increased continually to protect its gains from real, potential, imagined, or fictitious threats, transforming the Roman army in the process, until by the time of Julius Caesar it was possible for ambitious and insubordinate generals to attack and conquer large territories in pursuit of public fame, glory, and political power.

The ever-increasing territorial empire provided a constantly growing supply of slaves, land, spear-fodder, and products that could be turned to money by successful generals, venal officers, undisciplined legionnaires, usurious merchants, and above all, senators of the patrician order who were in a position to legislate wealth and privilege for themselves. Senators and any others who could, on however small a scale, invested in land; this was either land newly conquered and alienated from slain or

enslaved proprietors, or land abandoned by the free farmers and workers driven from their holdings by the increasing influx of slaves.

Each of the resources provided by conquest of new territory brought in its train new habits and attitudes and new consequences tending to the ruin of the state. The lure of the wealth that could be realized from them made wars of conquest an attractive enterprise to those who stood to gain-- and most Roman citizens felt they had something to gain. The influx of tens of thousands of slaves, from Greek rhetoricians to Pannonian swineherds, from British miners to Syrian dancers made possible a life of unprecedented leisure and self-indulgence. It promoted private cruelty, "culture races," and made possible the accumulation of vast wealth by individuals who did nothing to produce it, fostering a contempt for any labor other than that of seeking high office through influence and bribery.

The early flood of ambitious, loyal, and hopeful army recruits became a flood of reluctant conscripts of alien race, tongue, culture, and habit, with little loyalty to the professional army and none whatever to Rome. Such loyalty as they might feel was increasingly given to their own commander, their own imperator. In the end, their loyalty largely belonged to the man

who bribed them the most extravagantly.

More important and greater in volume and value than all the other products of the Empire combined were these: timber, for domestic and industrial fuel and construction of every kind of tool and machine from knife handles and distaffs to siege towers and triremes; oil, for light and cooking in hovel and palace; wine, the drink of slave and emperor; cereals, the basic foodstuff, of which the Italian peninsula could produce only a very small fraction of its needs. The people had to be fed, the army, the slaves, and the mass of the unemployed and under-employed city proletariat had to be fed. The slaves and the soldiers could to a large extent be fed from the resources of their provincial stations or estates, but the grossly swollen pauper populace could not. The government was therefore dependent on the grain of North

Africa for the stability of its rule: throughout the history of the Roman estate, from the Punic Wars to the end, the feeding of the Roman proletariat became a growing burden and a problem. The feeding of slaves was their masters' responsibility; the feeding of country people--the pagani-- was their own responsibility, the army could live by local requisition. But the Roman proletariat was large, loud, and active in protest. They were prone to riot, to commit indignities upon officials, and to destroy private property. They grew to be a constant threat and an ever-present political card of high value. Magistrates courted them and emperors appeased them. It was very largely for them that the grain fleets set out each year from Alexandria carrying the harvest of North Africa. Grain was distributed to the needy by ticket--a great bureaucracy developed around the import and distribution of this grain, from which some men got rich. This was the "panem" of the phrase "panem et circenses" in Juvenal's 10th Satire.

From North Africa too came the hundreds of thousands of animals which were slaughtered in the arenas to entertain and thereby distract the poor and restless. The non-arrival of the grain ships, or of advertised wild animals, could threaten the careers of magistrates, the lives of bureaucrats, the fate of emperors.

Oil, wine, grain, and domestic livestock were most efficiently produced on huge estates owned in absentia by wealthy senators, provincial governors, or emperors; and worked by slave sin regiments, overseen by slaves and former slaves. From these latifundia flowed immense profits for the owners and graft for bureaucrats.

Increasing access to wealth, whether a few more asses of copper than one had before, or thousands of asses of land with buildings, slaves, rents, and products worth millions of sestertii, created an insatiable appetite for more wealth. Greed ate the civic virtues praised by Roman writers praised by Roman writes: dignitas, gravitas, pietas.

Then there were the barbarians. They had always been there, of course. The Romans themselves started out as barbarians. Although they had been more or less in touch with Roman culture through trade and clashes with fronteir garrisons for a long time, it was not until the Gallic tribes had been conquered, Romanized, and co-opted that the Germanic-speaking tribes began seriously raiding the Romano-Gallic frontier in search of a little more land and a little booty. In the course of the 4th century the human tectonic shift that had begun when the Gothic speaking tribes wandered south from Scandinavia reached the eastern Germans. The shuffling and shoving of obscure bands of land-seekers in the dark forests finally pressed the German tribes against the frontiers of Italy itself. The Germans did not want to destroy Rome, they wanted to come into the Empire on their own terms, as settlers, not as captives or corpses. In time, a limited a number of them were permitted to settle in Northern Italy. In more time, they were able to appeal to an ancient military law and demand possession of one-third of selected estates.

The emperor, and the government long usurped from terrified, indolent, bewildered senators, staffed by a trawl of venal functionaries, were powerless to prevent the Germanization of the Empire north of the Mediterranean. The legions were spread very thinly from the norther frontiers on the Rhine and Danube Rivers, and ambitious generals no longer hesitated to lead their troops to the City to try for the aureate crown, leaving the provincials who had thought to depend on them looking into the pale moustaches of very large men with long spears and short Roman swords. What the Germans took, or were given, the Goths came later to rule—they were Germanic speakers too. So thiudireiks becomes Theoderic.

Rome defeated the Germans on the Rhine and surrendered to them on the Po. The whole process by which the Roman Empire allowed itself to be overcome at last by speakers of Germanic tongues and professors of Christianity is extremely complicated. The Romans themselves wove the strands that made the rope that checked them. The were, pre-eminently, a

society founded on, and dependent on, territorial and technological expansion, consolidated enterprise, economic efficiency, and avarice. Each of these supported all of the others, each grew out of all the others, all the others grew out of each of them. A single strand of the rope will serve as the example: conquest brought land and slaves which made the great estates possible, and the immense wealth which that system generated for landowners; that system dispossessed great numbers of free smallholders and laborers who sought work and opportunity in the city of Rome, which could not provide these, the workers of the city being slaves too--whether Athenian grammarians or Judean sewer cleaners. Free grain was a solution to starvation or riot, and that could only come in quantity by ship from North African estates. So in the later 5th century, the Vandel settlement around present-day Tunis and the piratical sea-power they developed the controlled the Roman grain supply.

A critical underlying cause of the devastating effects of many events in Roman imperial history is the lack of any unifying and consistent active policy of the government. The policy of the patricians had always been to get riches and keep power, but once the Latin tribes had been conquered in some degree Romanified, Rome had no policy but reaction. The senate, the emperors, the bureaucrats reacted to events piecemeal, and so, repeatedly, their response was expenditure which they could not afford and conquest which engendered enmity, paranoia, and further conquests.

In every aspect of Roman life and history, one finds the pulse of avarice--it came to control the magistracy and the senate, the bureaucracy, the emperors, the populace, and most critically, the army, which in the end gave itself up to the pleasures of making and unmaking emperors by murder and extortion. Pieces of the empire were conquered militarily by barbarians, as was Britain, but in the end, Rome was abducted and transported by aliens, to be returned as medieval Christendom--a pontifex, or a centurian, or an aedile, to be sure--but with a strange look in his eye.

A demo request for a full RenFaire type presentation two weeks after Valor will be declined with regrets. A presentation for the Boeing Employees Community Fund may result in some non-members attending interest group meetings. The possibility we look

into using the Sedgewick County Zoo for an event since we do volunteer work for Night of the Living Zoo. Marie will check into this. Bardic continues to be the last Monday of the month at Cerridwyn's.

The scheduled time for fighter practice on Sundays has been changed for the summer. Practice will begin at 10am at O.J. Watson Park. Armory tools were discussed and possible activities are being made.

The Seneschal reminded officers that the second quarter reports are due. Temporary recognition of the Middle Ages Recreation Society was granted by the WSU Multicultural Office with all the rights of a student organization. Official recognition by the student government will occur in the fall. Award recommendations for Kingdom awards need to be sent to Their Majesties as soon as possible. They will be very busy with Pennsic.

His Excellency announced that the decision on the next Baronage would be made this week by Their Majesties and announced at the Birthday Bash by His Majesty, who might attend, or by the Baronage. He also announced the Her Excellency Rhianwen would return from dirt camp July 4th.

Congratulations were extended to His Lordship Gawayne on his invitation to join the Chivalry. He has chosen to accept the accolade at Falcons.

The meeting was adjourned.
